

Debtors' Eighth and Ninth Omnibus Objections to Certain Tier I Proofs of Claim (Insufficient Information) (the "Insufficient Information Claims Objections").

By the Insufficient Information Claims Objections, the Debtors seek entry of an order disallowing and expunging certain claims related to asbestos and diacetyl where the claimants do not provide sufficient information to establish a valid claim (the "Disputed Claims").

By order dated August 21, 2009, the Court established October 30, 2009 (the "Bar Date") as the deadline to assert a claim against any of the Debtors. On January 20, 2010, the Court entered an order approving the Debtors' Motion for Entry of an Order Establishing Procedures for Objections to Claims (the "Claims Objection Procedures Order"). Pursuant to the Claims Objection Procedures Order, the Debtors may file omnibus objections to claims that, among other things, fail to provide sufficient information to support a valid claim. The Debtors believe that the Disputed Claims fail to provide information related to, among other things, (i) the claimant's alleged exposure to diacetyl or asbestos, (ii) where such exposure occurred, and (iii) the magnitude of the alleged injury. In addition, some of the Disputed Claims were asserted by certain corporate defendants who allege that they have indemnity and contribution claims against the Debtors on account of settlements to which the claimant is a party. In those instances, the Debtors assert that the Disputed Claims fail to identify the amount of the settlements and do not attach references to agreements or other documentation that establish claims against the Debtors for contribution or indemnification. Finally, the Debtors reserve the rights of all parties in interest to assert additional objections to the Disputed Claims in the future.

The Insufficient Information Claims Objections have been scheduled for hearing on February 23, 2010 at 9:45 a.m. (ET), with a corresponding objection deadline of February 16, 2010 at 4:00 p.m. (ET).
